
DIOCESE OF OGDENSBURG ERAS OF FOURTEEN BISHOPS

Sister Mary Christine Taylor, S.S.J. June 7, 2010

February 16, 1872 - Pope Pius IX established the Diocese of Ogdensburg, including all of St. Lawrence, Franklin, Clinton, Jefferson, Lewis, and Essex counties and that part of Hamilton and Herkimer counties above the northern lines of Ohio and Russia. 12,036 sq. mi., 38 parishes, 40 priests, for approximately 19,000 Catholics of the 290,000 population in the eight counties.

The motto of Bishop Wadhams, taken from *Ave Maris Stella*, indicated his dependence on Mary, Star of the Sea.

His coat of arms was modeled on that of the English Wadhams family -- a red shield with three silver roses. The shield was

surmounted by a pontifical hat, gallero, with six tassels in three rows, all in green, the heraldic insignia of a prelate. A processional cross, crosier, and bishop's mitre completed the external ornaments.

- Rector, Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Albany. Dedicated, November 21, 1852
- Vicar General for Bishop John J. Conroy, Albany
- Letter of Appointment to new See of Ogdensburg: February 25, 1872
- Ordained Bishop: May 5, 1872 by Archbishop John McCloskey, NY, assisted by Bishop Louis de Goesbriand, Burlington and Bishop John Williams, Boston, at Albany's Cathedral
- Installation as First Bishop of Ogdensburg at old St. Mary's Cathedral, Franklin Street, Ogdensburg, May 16, 1872 in the presence of Bishop Bernard McQuaid of Rochester
 - Reverend James Mackey of St. Mary's spoke, "God knows I needed help, but could not get it. At last a coadjutor has arrived and now things will go on better."

- Funeral: December 9, 1891. St. Maryse Cathedral. Archbishop Michael A. Corrigan
- Burial: Crypt below old St. Mary's Cathedral, Franklin Street until the church burned in November 1947. Recovered coffin interred in crypt of new St. Mary's Cathedral, 1952.

MESSAGE OF BISHOP WADHAMS ON HIS DEATHBED:

There must be unity... I want to insist upon unity. There may be some difference of ideas amongst us – we are of many different births—but for God's sake, let there be unity amongst us. . Struggle for the old faith. Be faithful in giving the sacraments. The priests are for the people, not the people for the priests.

SECOND BISHOP OF OGDENSBURG (1892-1921) THE MOST REVEREND HENRY GABRIELS (1838-1921)

In Virtute Dei In the Strength of God

This is the meaning of the Hebrew name, Gabriel. Beneath the motto is the symbol of the right arm of the Angel Gabriel, holding a lily, sign of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Above the motto is a sealed book on which sits the Lamb of God holding the cross of victory. This recalls Gabriel's message concerning the Redeemer of Whom Isaiah wrote, "He shall be led as a sheep to the slaughter and shall not open His mouth."





Most Reverend Henry Gabriels (1838 -1921) 2nd Bishop of Ogdensburg (1892-1921)

- Born: Wannegem-Lede, Belgium, October 6, 1838. Parents, Leopold and Rosalia Moerman Gabriels
- Education: St. Mary's College, Audenarde; Seminary of St. Nicholas; University of Louvain
- Ordained to Priesthood: September 21, 1861 by Bishop L.J. Delebecque at Ghent, Belgium
- Came to America with Belgian Missionary Band to serve as Professor of Dogmatic Theology at the new St. Joseph's Seminary, Troy, NY, October 17, 1864. Appointed President of St. Joseph's Seminary on July 3, 1871. Helped train over 700 priests.
- 1883: Secretary, Fourth Provincial Council of New York; prepared *Acta et Decreta*
- 1884: Secretary, Third Plenary Council of Baltimore. *The Baltimore Catechism*
- Appointed to See of Ogdensburg: December 20, 1891 by Pope Leo XIII. Letter of Appointment received on January 11, 1892.
- Ordained Bishop: May 5, 1892 by Archbishop Michael Augustine Corrigan of New York, assisted by Bishop Francis McNeirny of Albany and Bishop Patrick

Ludden of Syracuse, at Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Albany, NY

- Installation as Second Bishop of Ogdensburg at old St. Mary's Cathedral, Franklin Street: May 11, 1892 in the presence of Archbishops Fabre of Montreal, Duhamel of Ottawa, and Cleary of Kingston; Bishops McNeirny, McQuaid, Ludden, O'Farrell, and Meerschaert.
- Death: April 23, 1921. Episcopal Residence, Ogdensburg
- Funeral: April 28, 1921. *Requiem* offered by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey of Rochester in presence of Patrick Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York and other prelates.
- Burial: Crypt below old St. Mary's Cathedral until the burning of the Cathedral in November 1947. Recovered coffin interred in crypt of new St. Mary's Cathedral on Hamilton Street in 1952.

Eulogy by Patrick Cardinal Hayes:

His erudition was vast and solid in divinity and ecclesiastical science... Doctor Gabriels might have stepped out of the patristic age with the message of pure and pristine faith, his whole being was so steeped in orthodoxy and its basic arguments... He had no patience with anything that was not wholly of Christian teaching in studying and in discipline..." (April 28, 1921.)

MESSAGE OF BISHOP GABRIELS:

It is education in all its degrees, primary, secondary, and superior, that must preserve and extend Christianity in a nation, and education to be worthy of the name must be permeated and elevated by religious instruction. (January 7, 1904)


Most Reverend Joseph Henry Conroy, Auxiliary Bishop of Ogdensburg

THIRD BISHOP OF OGDENSBURG (1922-1939) THE MOST REVEREND JOSEPH HENRY CONROY (1858-1939)



Dominus Confortabit The Lord Will Comfort

Bishop Conroy was the first to include arms of the See of Ogdensburg on the dexter impalement of his shield. A silver fort signifying *Fort La Présentation* on a blue field sprinkled with golden oak leaves, symbols of Samuel Ogden (*oak dene*) who purchased and settled this region.



On the right field are the staff of St. Joseph, the bishop's patron, and a book representing Catholic education. The diagonal lines behind the book and staff come from the Conroy family shield of Ireland. Above the shield are the heraldic designs of a bishop—the green *gallero*, with its six tassels arranged in three rows on either side, a miter, crosier, and processional cross.

Most Reverend Joseph H.Conroy(1858-1939) Auxiliary Bishop (1912-21) 3rd Bishop of Ogdensburg (1922-39)

- Assignments: Churubusco, Rouses Point
- Ogdensburg: Rector of St. Mary's Cathedral, April 27, 1883 to 1921; Chancellor 1894-98; Diocesan Consultor, 1897; Vicar General, 1901.
- Appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Ogdensburg and Titular Bishop of Arindela by Pope Pius X on March 11, 1912
- Ordained Bishop: May 1, 1912 by John Cardinal Farley of New York, assisted by Bishop Charles H.
 Colton of Buffalo and Bishop Henry Gabriels of Ogdensburg at St. Mary's Cathedral, Ogdensburg

- Appointed Third Bishop of Ogdensburg by Pope Benedict XV: December 22, 1921
- Installation: January 18, 1922 at St. Mary's Cathedral by Archbishop Patrick Hayes of New York
- Death: March 20, 1939 at Episcopal Residence, Washington Street, Ogdensburg, NY
- Funeral: March 22, 1939, St. Mary's Cathedral. Celebrant: Archbishop Thomas Walsh, Newark, NJ
- Burial: St. Mary's Cemetery on Heuvelton Road, Ogdensburg, NY

MESSAGE OF BISHOP CONROY:

The cross is my banner. . . from it I resolve to draw my doctrine and my learning (*Journal*, 1881)

Exercises of Piety depend first on:

- Order. St. Augustine says, "Ordo ducit ad Deum." Sitting up late ruins health and utility of many a good priest. Go to bed early and rise early.
- <u>Meditation.</u> It is the only way to imbue myself with piety and unless I am imbued, I cannot feed others.
- Thanksgiving after Mass. Never omit.
- <u>Frequent Confession</u> once a week. Choose a good confessor who knows his theology. Learning is as necessary in him as piety.
- Aspirations. Easy. Can be said everywhere and at every time
- <u>Priestly Duties</u>. Mass and Holy Office are the two hinges on which swings the life of a priest. Mass will always be said with just the same devotion as Office is recited. (*Journal*, 1883)


FOURTH BISHOP OF OGDENSBURG (1939-42) THE MOST REVEREND FRANCIS JOSEPH MONAGHAN (1890-1942)

Dominus Praeceptor The Lord is my Teacher

Beneath the green *gallero* with its six tassels arranged in three rows on either side of the shield are the processional cross, miter, and crosier of a prelate of rank of bishop.

On the blue dexter impalement is the silver Fort La Présentation, surrounded by the golden oak leaves, oak den). The sinister impalement has a chevron and two stars derived from the Irish coat of arms

of the Monaghans. A silver crescent commemorates Bishop Monaghan's former service on the faculty of Seton Hall College and Immaculate Conception Seminary.



Most Reverend Francis J. Monaghan (1890-1942) Coadjutor Bishop of Ogdensburg (1936-1939) 4th Bishop of Ogdensburg (1939-1942)



- Born: Newark, NJ October 30, 1890. Parents: Thomas and Anne Daly Monaghan
- Education: Seton Hall and North American College in Rome
- Ordained to Priesthood: May 29, 1915 by Cardinal Pompili at Basilica of St.

John Lateran, Rome

- Assignments: St. Paul of the Cross, Jersey City; Professor of Sacred Theology at Immaculate Conception Seminary, Darlington, NJ and St. Elizabeth's College, Convent Station
- President of Seton Hall College, June 7, 1933
- Appointed Coadjutor Bishop of Ogdensburg by Pope Pius XI, April 1936.
- Ordained Bishop: June 29, 1936 by Bishop Thomas J. Walsh, assisted by Bishop Thomas McLaughlin, Newark and Bishop Joseph H. Conroy at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Newark, NJ
 - Arrived in Ogdensburg: July 7, 1936 and became Rector of St. Mary's Cathedral
- Since he was Coadjutor Bishop, he became Fourth Bishop of Ogdensburg on March 20, 1939 when Bishop Conroy died. No formal installation.
- May 2, 1939 Pontifical Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral celebrating his accession to the See
- Death: November 13, 1942 at Mercy Hospital, Watertown, NY due to bronchopneumonia and complications from a fall between two New York Central railroad cars, September 26, 1942.
- Funeral: November 18, 1942, St. Mary's Cathedral, Ogdensburg, NY. Requiem offered by Archbishop Francis J. Spellman of New York
- Burial: St. Mary's Cemetery on Heuvelton Road, Ogdensburg, NY


MESSAGE OF BISHOP MONAGHAN:


We priests are God's agents to save souls. Every moment of our days and nights must be spent in the service of Our Lord, preaching, administering the Sacraments, and praying for the souls God has created and died for...

... Give the catechetical instructions yourself, not through some other person. You are the educated one, the prepared one, the capable one. Teach the religion you studied in the seminary, that you meditated upon... Your whole priesthood cries out for a chance to teach. You teach the children... Live up to your Divine calling. (Pastoral Letter, 1941)

FIFTH BISHOP OF OGDENSBURG (1943-53) THE MOST REVEREND BRYAN JOSEPH MCENTEGART (1893-1968)







Estote Factores Verbi Be Doers of the Word

The blue dexter field of Bishop McEntegart's shield has the silver fortress of *La Présentation* and golden oak leaves of the Ogdens (*oak dene*). The sinister impalement has a golden chalice, symbol of the priesthood and three shamrocks taken from the coat of arms of the McEntegart family of

Ireland. The star above the chalice represents the bishop's former service as National Secretary for the Catholic Near East Missions. The background of red, symbol of charity, commemorates the bishop's years in the office of Catholic Charities.

External ornaments include the green *gallero*, the processional cross, miter, and crosier denoting the episcopal rank.

- Education: Manhattan College; St. Joseph's Seminary, Yonkers, NY
- Ordained to priesthood: September 8, 1917 by John Cardinal Farley at St. Patrick's Cathedral, NYC
- Assignment: Survey of charitable agencies of the Archdiocese of New York. Establishment of the first office of Catholic Charities in New York.
- Appointed Fifth Bishop of Ogdensburg by Pope Pius XII, June 5, 1943
- Ordained Bishop: August 3, 1943 by Archbishop Amleto G. Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate, assisted by Bishop Edmund F. Gibbons of Albany and Bishop Stephen J. Donahue of New York at St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York City
- Presentation of Credentials to Board of Diocesan Consultors of Ogdensburg at the Episcopal Residence, August 9, 1943
- Installation: August 10, 1943 with Bishop Walter Foery of Syracuse leading the bishop to the episcopal throne in the old St. Mary's Cathedral. Solemn Pontifical Mass celebrated by Bishop Francis McIntyre of New York in the presence of many prelates.

- Appointed Rector of the Catholic University of America by Pope Pius XII, June 6, 1953
- Farewell Mass: St. Mary's Cathedral, August 18. Vacated See, August 20, 1953

MESSAGE OF BISHOP MCENTEGART:

The Bishop must be Christ to his flock. He leads his priests by serving, even as he serves by leading. . .From Our Divine Lord comes the sacred mission which makes the priests of the diocese fellow-shepherds of the Bishop. Boundless love urges them on to care for the flock of God without stay or stint. . . There is a loftier ambition than merely to rise high in the world. It is to stoop down and to lift mankind a little higher. The true Christian gently, lovingly raises his neighbor whenever injustice or misfortune grinds him down. The homeless child, the weary worker, the sick in body or in mind – all are Christ's, all are our neighbors, all are a charge upon our hearts and upon our consciences. (Homily at Installation, August 1943)

The green gallero with six tassels arranged in three rows on either side of the shield, and the miter, crosier, and processional cross symbolize the bishop's rank. The dexter impalement of the See of Ogdensburg includes a blue background, silver *Fort La Présentation*, and golden oak leaves of the family of Samuel Ogden. (*oak dene*)

On the right hand side is a blue star on a silver field, honoring Mary, the Morning Star. The mountain or *berg* recalls the bishop's

German heritage, while two ears of corn signify his mother's family, *Kern*. Three ermine crosses commemorate Bishop Kellenberg's former service to Cardinal Spellman and the green background, his eighteen years at St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York City

Bishop Navagh's coat of arms bears symbols of his episcopal office – the green *gallero* with six tassels arranged in three rows on each side of a shield, and the miter, processional cross, and crosier. The dexter field of blue has a silver fort recalling *La*



Présentation and golden oak leaves (oak dene).

On the sinister field of the shield, a chevron with rafters supporting a roof recalls Bishop Navagh's forebearers who were shipbuilders. The bishop also intended that the rafters portray his ardent desire to build in Christ and for Christ. Two stars symbolize the Blessed Virgin Mary as Star of the Sea and Morning Star.

The escallop of St. James the Greater, the bishop's patron saint, recall the bishop's years as Director of the Missionary Apostolate and his desire to fulfill the commission of Jesus: "Going therefore,

teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

- <u>The Catechism.</u>.. Make the revelation of Christ known...build Catholic schools with the aim in view of obtaining complete Catholic education for everyone who bears the Catholic name, from kindergarten to University. It means to make Religious Instruction a part of home life, a part of school life, a part of life of every Catholic no matter what his age...
- The Church and the Tabernacle. . . We will labor, then, using all of the concessions granted by our Holy Father, regarding the Eucharistic Fast and regarding evening Masses, that it be the ordinary practice of the faithful of Ogdensburg to hear Mass and receive Holy Communion every single day.
- The Rosary. Our Aim... to get every Catholic in the diocese, to carry a Rosary. You will notice I don't say "to say the Rosary" but "to carry the Rosary" because experience of the Church is that a person who carries a rosary with him usually develops the habit of saying it every day... We will try to make the Family Rosary part and parcel of Catholic life among our people.

As Our Holy Father Pope Pius XII has said on so many occasions, we must never make the mistake of aiming at mediocrity; we must aim high and plan on a grand scale, trusting in the Infinite Power of God to make a reality of our humble efforts.



Bishop Smith's shield is surmounted by the green gallero with six tassels, arranged in three rows on either side of the shield and a processional cross, miter, and crosier -- symbols of the episcopacy. n the left blue field are symbols of the See of Ogdensburg - Fort La Présentation and the seme of gold leaves from the arms of Samuel Ogden (oak dene). On the right field are the saltire and crescents from the arms of the Celtic Smith family of Scotland.

The red hand of Ulster is from the escutcheon of his mother's family, the O'Neills of Ireland. Three crescent moons symbolize Mary, who has been depicted with "the moon under her feet." The lion's head is a reminder of the bishop's patron, St. Leo.



The two spearheads on the sinister impalement recall the martyrdom of St. Thomas, his patron, while the cross of St. Andrew commemorates his father's patron. The oak tree is from the arms of the Donnellan family of Galway, Ireland and the two ermine crosses from

Cardinal Spellman's insignia. The arms of the See of Ogdensburg, Fort La Présentation and golden leaves of the Ogdens (oak dene) are imposed on the blue dexter field of the shield.



Bishop Brzana's coat of arms has a green *gallero*, with tassels and a cross surmounting the shield. The left blue side of the shield bears the arms of the See of Ogdensburg, *Fort La Présentation* and golden leaves of the Ogden family.

The sinister field includes a fish, symbol of the Polish family of Brzana, and two stars representing the Mikosz family of the bishop's mother. The stars also denote the bishop's role to teach the Truth, and honor his own teachers (Jesuits, Franciscans, Felicians, and parish priests.) The basket of loaves represents the Holy Eucharist. The olive branches and the crown honor Mary, Queen of Peace. The wavy bars are reminders of the waters of Lake Erie and the Niagara frontier, homeland of Bishop Brzana.

Fort La Présentation and a semé of gold oak leaves representing the Ogden family oak dene.

The green field on the right side of the shield reflects the bishop's Italian surname Loverde "the green one." A silver anchor, symbol of hope, interlaced with a gold "M", the monogram of the Blessed Virgin Mary, is taken from the arms of Pope John Paul II who appointed Bishop Loverde to the episcopacy in the Marian Year of 1987-88. This symbol also expresses that our hope comes from Christ through Mary, and resembles the Resurrection Cross by which Christ gave hope of eternal life. The silver star represents Polaris,

the North Star, and is taken from the arms of the Diocese of Norwich "North Town" where Bishop Loverde first served as a priest. The blue and silver wavy bars, taken from the arms of the



Bishop Barbarito's coat of arms includes the episcopal symbols and the arms of the Diocese of Ogdensburg. The silver field on right side has an open Book of the Gospels, with a gold *Alpha* and *Omega* on the spine. The upside-down position of

the book recalls that the Gospels, placed over the head of a bishop at his episcopal ordination, must be his helmet. The front cover contains a skewed cross, taken from the arms of Pope John Paul II, and the *fleur-de-lis* and crescent, honoring Bishop Francis Mugavero and Bishop Thomas Daily who ordained Bishop Barbarito. Two golden hills with three green fir trees, are taken from the arms of the Salesians, founded by St. John Bosco, a model for parish priests. The center pine tree with visible roots denote the Italian name *Barbarito*, "roots". Two black moorcocks with red crests show the bishop's devotion to St. Thomas More, patron saint of canon lawyers. On his feast, the bishop began working in the Brooklyn Chancery and also received word of his elevation to the office of Bishop.






